YOUNG WOMAN CHOSEN AS NATIONAL CANDIDATE

A 22-year-old Parliamentary research officer, Miss Marilyn Waring, was selected on Monday evening as National's candidate for the Raglan Electorate.

Miss Waring is thought to be the youngest woman ever selected for such a position in a rural district.

Commenting on the outcome of the selection, the retiring member for Raglan, Mr Doug Carter, said it was somewhat surprising but he was pleased with the decision. "Her winning in a field of that calibre is a great credit to her. I'm just worried that she may work too hard—Raglan is a big electorate to cover by yourself.

"It is a surprise for a girl to get a country seat but I don't believe people will take her lightly—I've been talking to some hard-bitten farmers here and they've told me they voted for her," said Mr Carter.

Miss Waring's parents are residents of Huntly and her father operates a butchery business in the aMin Street.

From 1957-1964 Miss Waring attended the Taupiri Primary School. After this she went on to Ngaruawahia High School and Waikato Diocesan between 1967-69 and was dux of the school during this period. A further three years was spent at Victoria University of Wellington where she gained honours in political science.

She enjoys many of the outdoor sports. In 1972 she was controller for the N.Z.U. Ski Tournament where she won the drinking horn. In 1973 she was elected an executive member of the N.Z. Universities' Sports Union.

Four Waikato University players, G. N. Kane, B. A. Stephens, P. A. Eggleton and J. M. Walters, are in the NZU Rugby team to tour California, Ireland and Japan in February and March.

It will be centre threequarter Kane's second visit to Ireland in just over a year, as he was there with the All Blacks last November. He hit very impressive form against King Country and Auckland in Waikato's last two representative matches in the recently completed season.

Stephens, chosen as a five-eighth, was in very good club form after a late start this season. He was not available for representative selection but made a big impact when he went on as a replacement at first five-eighth for North Island Universities during the second half of a game against the South at Palmerston North in June. As a result he was picked at second five-eighth for the NZU team which beat Manawatu 19-7.

Mourners gather

Hundreds of mourners from throughout New Zealand will be gathering at Turangawaewae Marae over the next few days to pay their last respects at the tangi for Wiremu Te Ranga Poutapu — master carver and revered Maori elder — who died in Ngaruawahia yesterday.

Mr Poutapu, 70, had been ill for some time.

Known as Piri, Mr Poutapu was a master carver for Turangawaewae Marae — home marae of the Maori Queen — for most of his life.

He spent a lifetime perpetuating the arts of the Maori and scores of meet-

ing houses throughout New Zealand and many canoes are the result of his craftsmanship.

Mr Poutapu was awarded the MBE in last year's Queen's Birthday honours list.

He was a member of the Maori Queen's Council of 12 an elder of the Ngati-koroki sub-tribe and resided at Ngaruawahia most of his life.

Born at Maungatautari in 1905 Mr Poutapu moved with his family to Raungawari near Pukekawa in 1910 then to Turangawaewae Marae when it was re-established in 1921.

He trained as a carpenter

and when his carving talent became evident was sent to the Ohinemutu carving school in Rotorua in 1926.

Mr Poutapu helped carve Turangawaewae's Mahinarangi meeting house in 1929 and Turongo the Queen's official residence, built in 1938.

He was the last surviving carver who helped construct Ngatokimatawhaorua the great war canoe at Waitangi, Tumanako and Rangatahi, the war canoes made at Turangawaewae in 1938 and he supervised the construction of Taheretikitiki canoe in 1972.

Mr Poutapu's work on Taheretikitiki was of crucial

for carver's tangi

importance in canoe construction. He was the last of the skilled canoe builders and through this canoe he transmitted his knowledge to a new generation.

In all, he trained 18 carvers.

He was responsible also for the renovation of Te Winika canoe in 1972 prior to its presentation to the Waikato Museum.

He trained the late Inia Te Wiata in the art of carving and he directed the completion of the pou which Inia had partially completed and which was destined for New Zealand House in London.

His art is also represented

in the meeting houses at the Polynesian cultural centre at Laie, Hawaii.

Mr Poutapu's latest work was on the decorations of the new Kimiora cultural centre at Turangawaewae, and at the time of his death was planning the construction of a fleet of river canoes under partial construction at the marae.

As a leading elder of Waikato he helped receive many distinguished visitors to Turangawaewae and was presented to Queen Elizabeth II in February last year.

Today, Mr Poutapu's body was lying in Pare Waikato, the meeting house of the

tangata whenua (the local people.)

A funeral service will be held on Sunday at 11 a.m., followed by the burial on sacred Taupiri Mountain.

Mr Poutapu is survived by three sons and a daughter.

The Maori Queen, Dame Te Atairangikaahu, will not be returning from overseas to attend the funeral, a marae spokesman said today.

Dame Te Ata travelled to Britain in June, and for the past six weeks has been visiting Europe and the US. She is due back in New Zealand at the end of the month.
